
What do Release of Information Specialists do?

Release of information specialists, often called

electronic health records technicians, deliver medical records and procedural information to the proper recipients. It's a behind-the-scenes role that greatly impacts the patient experience. As such, strict adherence to HIPAA guidelines is absolutely essential. The most successful ROI specialists also have exceptional customer service skills, strong attention to detail, and an uncanny ability to work well in groups as they often collaborate with other specialists.

Where do they work?

When it comes to physical expectations, this role is similar to a standard desk job. Hospitals, health clinics, and physicians' offices are generally all staffed with some level of health information technician support—there's also potential to work from home, depending on the needs and expectations of your employer.



How much do they earn?

While this isn't a patient-facing role, the impact Release of Information specialists have on health systems is undeniable—and the salary potential is a reflection of that impact. The salary for this specific role varies based on location and experience, but the national median annual income, according to the U.S. Bureau of Labor Statistics, is \$45,240.*
